Sooner Sobriety

Why am I here? That question has entered my mind many, many times in the last 53 years. Since early childhood, I felt as if I missed out on what everyone else had naturally. Even when I grew up and graduated from high school, I felt Less Than. Even being the first in my family to graduate from college was not enough. I still had low self-esteem... except when I drank whiskey. It made me feel like enough. It made me feel OK, or even better than others. But whiskey took over my life and the blackout davs began. I started drinking so much every day that only one or two drinks would send me into a state of drunkenness.

My job in the oilfield required driving 100,000 miles a year. I estimate that nearly half of those were driven in a blackout. I began to have trouble with my family, my job, my coworkers and friends. I began to live in fear that

I might be insane or would die in prison or a mental hospital. Thoughts of suicide entered my mind.

The last few years of my drinking, I tried to quit multiple times in multiple ways. I tried switching from whiskey to beer, from beer to wine, from wine to martinis. I saw a doctor, my wife dragged me to her minister, I took pledges, promising my wife that I would quit. None of them worked.

I had lived my entire life as an agnostic. Then one night, I was stumbling around my living room, too drunk to stand. I leaned against my stereo console to keep from falling. I looked in the mirror above the stereo and I saw what I had become. I cried out "God, help me!" That was the turning point that changed my life.

Not long after, me and my friend Paul were hiding from our wives in a barn, drinking wine. Out of the blue, I told Paul that I thought I might have a drinking problem. His eves lit up and he said, "I've been going to AA! I know some guys who would really like to talk to you." It didn't cross my mind that he was still drinking while talking about AA! Either way, it was a start. This was just before Christmas and I knew I couldn't stay sober through the holidays, so Paul set up an appointment for me with Alcoholics Anonymous after the New Year.

I wasn't sober when Leo, Leon and Charlie came to my home and told me their stories about drinking. I identified with them, suspecting that somehow my wife had talked to

After we talked, I decided I was willing to try this. They asked me if I could go without a drink for 24 hours. If I could, they would pick me up and take me to the Saturday night meeting. I had hope that they were going to teach me how to control my drinking.

I woke up Saturday morning and fought my way through the day, but I couldn't do it. I really understood that day that I couldn't control my drinking. When they picked me up I was half drunk. They took me to the meeting anyway, and I told my wife when I got home that I thought I would try this. After that first meeting, I had my last glass of whiskey and haven't had a drink since. That was 53 years ago. The date was February 1, 1969.

One day at a time, I began my journey in AA. I was still an agnostic, so I started with the Group as my Higher Power. Even though I was new, I think now that God had been with me all along, even back to those days of driving 100K miles drunk. He had heard my cry and put the right people in my life at just the right time. He then helped me turn down whiskey through cravings that lasted two years.

Through the days, my Higher Power helped me past the cravings, the doubts and the "yebbuts". I tried to do a smorgasbord of the steps, skipping back and forth, saying, "Yebbut, I'm different, I don't need to take inventory or tell someone else my faults." After two years of this, I went to a Friday night speaker's meeting. The speaker, Henry, told his story, which was very similar to mine. Henry said he had been in AA many years, but he could only stay sober 2 years at a time. He refused to take Steps 4 and 5 because of fear and would end up drinking again. Once he finally took Steps 4 and 5, he lost the craving and was now 7 years sober. I believe God was speaking to me through

Henry that night.

The next morning, I went down to the clubhouse, into a quiet secluded space and took Step 3 for the first time ever. I knew then how Bill W. must have felt when he had his burning bush experience. I immediately had the desire to begin writing my inventory. I finished Step 4 in about 4 hours and immediately wanted to tell someone. I went to the payphone in the clubhouse and let my fingers do the walking through the vellow pages. I found a church and dialed the number. A man answered, "My name is Father Schwartz, may I help you?" I started explaining what I needed with Step 5 and he stopped me, saving, "I was just transferred to this church last week from a church in Kansas City, where I helped the AA groups there with Step 5. I know

what you need". So, my Higher Power had once again come to my rescue with what I needed. I made an appointment and did my Fifth Step that week. Even though I wasn't Catholic, or even a Christian, Father Schwartz broke the rules and gave me the Right of Absolution. I didn't know it at the time, but God removed the craving from me that day and to date, it has not returned.

One of my stepdaughters recently asked my wife and I to keep her dog for a couple of weeks. He is a small, very active mixed breed, who is very friendly, with a strong personality. He and I bonded immediately. He loved standing up by my chair and laving his head on my knees. He laid in my lap when I let him. He would stay on command. I could have taught him tricks, I think. It finally occurred to me that he was giving me unconditional love. Just the kind that God has given me all along, despite my "yebbuts", doubts and resistance to our program, even a resistance to a Higher Power.

I believe I now have the answer to why I am here. I think God wants me to give that same unconditional love to Him, my family, my friends, and AA.

By the way, the dog's name is "Whiskey"!



Pamphlet of the Month:

Many Paths to Spirituality



This pamphlet begins with the newcomer to Alcoholics Anonymous. It says that they "are approaching AA at the rate of tens of thousands yearly. They represent almost every belief and attitude imaginable." It then goes on to spell out the misconception that AA is a religious organization. In time it explains how, instead, Alcoholics Anonymous is a spiritual program. And finally, the pamphlet uses member's reflections to point out the "Many Path to Spirituality." From the lifelong Catholic, to the Native American to the Agnostic and more, members outline how they experience spirituality in the rooms. And for some, it is simply AA itself:

> "AA, I believe is truly universal, and this conscience that has changed the lives of so many, and continues saving the lives of so many more is worthy of my devotion. I have never seen or felt anything more spiritual than what I witness when I see the transformation that takes place as people begin to live this way of life."
