My Milkshakes Bring Me to Reality Hard

This is the story of my roundabout journey to a real, solid step one. I was about four months sober, after resetting my sobriety over something I had deep down suspected was a technicality at the behest of my sponsor. I was moderately sure I was an alcoholic, though I came in young at the age of twenty, after having my first drink only four years prior. It was a Tuesday evening, I had just gotten out of an AA meeting, and went with nearly the entire group to a nearby burger joint. It was a good meeting, all was well, and I felt in high spirits, and close to the people around me, which for someone like me is one of the best feelings imaginable. We ordered food, and I ordered a milkshake along with my burger. The name of the milkshake was "The Queen," which I felt was fitting given that I am a gay man. The waitress responded "You mean, the Evil Oueen?" To which I replied with an over exaggerated "Yaaaas," figuring I had misread the name. We get our food, and I get my milkshake, and I remember not much liking the taste, but I drank it anyway.

After I was about halfway through, I remember thinking to myself that actually, this was a really good milkshake. The thought came to me that maybe I should have another, which was such a bizarre thought, and I would prefer to fit into the jeans I had just bought, so I didn't order a second. Afterwards, I drove my sponsor home. He had just had surgery, so I was at the wheel, and I started feeling unwell. Like panicky, nauseated, short of breath, and

grumpy, which was very odd. Talking with my sponsor, I figured I'd just had too much sugar, and too long of a day, and I tried to put my thoughts at ease. On my drive home, now alone, my brain started racing. I started thinking how easy it would be to stop by a bar on my way home, or at least go buy some beer from a gas station. I started panicking, this was the very first time since the night I came into AA that I'd ever had this intense of a craving. Maybe I wasn't doing my stepwork right, and God had abandoned me. I thought, "Wait, nope, hold on Crazy, God, help! And begun to pray like my life depended on it (and really it did).

The thought came to me to call my sponsor, even though he was probably asleep, this is what sponsors are for. So I called him, and he woke up and talked to me all the way home, having no more idea

than I about why this was happening. He talked to me till I got home to my roommates, who took over from there until I was able to get to sleep. In the morning I woke up and thanked God for keeping me sober. I assumed it was some kind of fluke, but it scared the hell out of me, so I made sure to pray and do my stepwork.



Days, weeks, months went by, and eventually our group went back to the same burger place after a meeting. I opened the menu, and I saw the milkshake menu, I shuddered, figuring since that event that milkshakes don't agree with my physiology. And I saw, on the left side, their regular milkshakes, including The Queen, and on the right, their "Boozy Milkshakes" menu, listing the "Evil Queen." My heart just about stopped when suddenly that night months ago made a whole lot more sense. I did not order a milkshake that night. I couldn't believe I hadn't drawn the connection, I just didn't believe it was possible to accidentally order an alcoholic beverage after an AA meeting, and unknowingly drink it literally while fellowshipping with my AA group. But crazier things have happened to less crazy people. Unsettling as this story is, it ended up being one of the greatest gifts to my sobriety.

Self knowledge will not keep me sober, but it doesn't hurt. I now had irrefutable proof of what happens when any amount of alcohol enters my body. A perfect control study. At the height of a pink cloud of early sobriety, even a small amount of alcohol sends me right into an obsessive frenzy, craving another drink. A nonalcoholic, plain and simple, would not have reacted the way I did. This memory has been a great asset to me, at times when I consider to myself how I've been sober longer than I ever drank for, still an alcoholic. Or gosh, I'm so much happier than I was, surely I wouldn't drink the way I used to?

Nope, still an alcoholic. My milk-shake incident has been the firm-est bedrock on which I've built my first step. I have concrete evidence, to affirm that I am a real alcoholic and am powerless over the effects any amount of alcohol has on my body. It's been years since then, and I've never since doubted my alcoholism. I've also completely lost my appetite for milkshakes, and haven't had one since.



"If, as AA members, we can each refuse public prestige and renounce any desire for personal power; if, as a movement, we insist on remaining poor, so avoiding disputes about extensive property and its management; if we steadfastly decline all political, sectarian, or other alliances, we shall avoid internal division and public notoriety; if, as a movement we remain a spiritual entity concerned only with carrying our message to fellow sufferers without charge or obligation; then only can we most effectively complete our mission....Thus far we have succeeded because we have been different. May we continue to be so!"

These words, written by Bill W., are part of the foreword to the pamphlet on how the 12 Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous developed. It is comprised of little essays on different aspects of the Traditions, with an especially heavy emphasis on the topic of Anonymity.
