Sobriety After Sixty

I was 68 years old when I came into Alcoholics Anonvmous as a heavy drinker who wanted to learn how to control his drinking. I first realized that alcohol was causing problems in my life around my midtwenties. A few incidents had occurred, including my first DWI, that lead me to this conclusion. I remember thinking that I would have to manage my drinking better-not that there was any problem with me. This attitude remained with me until I came through the doors of A.A. I was later to discover that I had not managed well at all, that only by the grace of God was I able to avoid catastrophe during a 50+ year drinking career. My heavy drinking did not start until I joined the military in the early 70's. I soon discovered that drinking to excess was not only the norm but almost expected if you wanted to be accept-

As I aged, my body matured, but my mind did not. As a result of my behavior at military and social

ed. I plunged into this life-

style with more vigor than

most.

events I was labeled an "Alcoholic" halfway through my 20-year career. My response was that I would outperform my peers so the military would have to promote me in rank. Little did I know at the time that my record was "red flagged" and was never to be seen by the promotion board again, no matter what my performance.

I was able to retire at 20 years' service but with a severe resentment which I held on to until I came into AA.

Following the military career, I worked for a major shipping company performing the same work I did in the military. I was still a daily beer drinker but with a wife and children, so I seldom let myself get out of control. Eventually, I gained seniority with the company and was able to have more control over my schedule, allowing more and more opportunity to drink the way I liked, to excess.

My job involved traveling most weeks to locations in other cities. During the last

5 years of my 21-year career with the company I was able to pick not only my locations, but which flights to take to get there and back and the time of day I would work. This developed into a routine of getting drunk on the outbound flight and every night I was away from home. This seemed perfectly normal to me at the time. I was managing my drinking and staying out of trouble--no problem here.

Having eluded numerous opportunities to ruin my career and family life, I retired at age 65 to finally begin living a life where I could drink without fear of consequences, or so I thought. Things quickly went south. Children were grown and gone; the 2nd wife was a teetotaler. My promises to stop or moderate my drinking, although sincere, were impossible to keep. Arguments became a daily affair. Resentments started to mount with family and friends. I distinctly remember walking out the front door of my house one day thinking that I was not a happy person and won-

dering why. The thought that alcohol might be a problem never occurred to me, for it was the solution to all my problems, the key to happiness. It was a beautiful Saturday morning as I sat outside my workshop feeling very low because of my conduct the night before, what I could remember of it. As my wife approached from the house, I felt a sense of impending doom like I had never felt before. To my complete surprise, the first words out of my mouth were "I think I might have a drinking problem, maybe I should go to an AA meeting". I would later find out that my wife was coming out to ask me for a divorce. That afternoon I attended my first ever AA meeting, picking up a Big Book as suggested.

On my second meeting it was suggested that I get a sponsor. I asked the friendliest looking person in the room to be my sponsor. He declined but asked me to attend a meeting with him the following night. Upon walking into the room of the new group I was taken aback by the fellowship. Everyone was smiling, laughing, hugging, and shaking hands. I stood there and thought to myself, "I don't know what you people have but I want it.". Thus started my new life in AA. I found a sponsor that night and began working the steps. After a few months and approaching step 3, I had a spiritual awaking. God had always been working in my

life; I just chose to ignore Him. For the first time in my life, I could look back and see that my life had been anything but normal. Resentments melted away. Not being promoted in the military was sound judgement on their part. I would not have promoted me either. However, one thing confused me. Why did God choose to save me and what took Him so long? I did not deserve this peace and serenity. I had shunned God ever since the age of 14 when I had figured out that I could not live up to His standards, so why bother. Being brought up with religion, I believed there was a God, but He would have nothing to do with a sinner like myself. All the hundreds, if not thousands of near misses had been simply coincidences, so I thought. I now realize that He was protecting me from myself to get me to where I am, so there must be a reason.

Without realizing it, I soon found myself diving into service work and sponsoring others. The organizational skills I had learned in the military were now being used for something other than myself. The true happiness I had longed for had returned. I'm now able to look people in the eyes with a feeling of sincerity and kindness. With a little over 3 years sobriety, I attempt to practice the AA principles and live a life outside of my own self-interest. I do not know how much time I have left on earth, but I do know that I want to spend whatever time there is helping others. I can never balance the scales with the past, but I can hope to tip them in a positive direction for as long as God permits.

I can tell you that every Friday night when I walk into the facility and a group of guys is standing outside the classroom waiting on me, it

makes my heart happy. If we don't bring them a meeting, they don't get one. They can't just run into any group and hear a message of hope. I feel as safe there as any place on earth. Those guys would never let anything happen to methat is a guaranteed. I go to prison on Friday night so I don't have to go to prison. It is the bright spot of my week and I love those guys like my brothers. I have had the pleasure working with several guys on the inside and now they are free men, living a life they never dreamed possible. If you want to be a part of helping someone's son or daughter get free indeed, come join us. We have badging workshops on a regular basis. You won't have any trouble finding out how; I promise you someone in

your homegroup is doing corrections. Reach out to any member of the Oklahoma corrections committee, our chair or myself.
